

COVER COMPOSER GREG STEINKE

Composers Bureau Member Greg Steinke was the 2022 Inter-American Music Award (IAMA) Winner at this past summer's 2022 SAI National Convention in Greensboro, NC. His SUITE-in memory of Chief Joseph for Bass Clarinet and Piano was performed at the IAMA Premier Concert on Friday, July 29th by Joanna McCoskey Wiltshire, bass clarinet, and Jasmin Arakawa, piano. It was written as an additional memorial to Chief Joseph and his band and grows out of a continuing fascination with and study of Northwest Native Americans. This is a continuation of a series of chamber pieces (already written and/or projected) which represent, for the composer, musical excursions into the Northwest's history, geography, and ethnology.

The present work is freely conceived, being through-composed and based on a cyclic, multipart approach to form; no "system" as such is used, and the composer has felt free to draw upon whatever compositional resources suitable for his purpose. These movements represent "abstractions" of the place/situation entitled. They should be enjoyed as is but with reflection upon the implications suggested.

Greg A Steinke is Former Chair, Departments of Art and Music, (The Joseph Naumes Endowed Chair in Music), and Associate Dean of Undergraduate Studies, Marylhurst University, Marylhurst, OR (retired, 6/15/01); Associate Director, Ernest Bloch Music Festival (1993-97) and Director, Composers Symposium (1990-97) (Newport, OR). He holds a BM degree from Oberlin Conservatory, a MM degree from Michigan State University, a MFA degree from the University of Iowa, and a PhD from Michigan State University. He has written articles on new oboe literature and music composition and revisions to the Paul Harder Harmonic Materials in Tonal Music. 6th-10th Ed., Basic Materials in Music Theory, 7th-13th Ed., Bridge to Twentieth-Century Music, Rev. Ed. for Pearson, and with H Owen Reed the Harder-Reed Basic Contrapuntal Techniques for Warner Bros. Pub.; and "Music for Dance: An Overview" in The Dance Has Many Faces, 3rd Ed., Ed. by Walter Sorell, a cappella books.

Steinke has served as the National Chairman of the Society of Composers, Inc. (1988-97) and is currently national President of NACUSA (2012-19). He is a Board Member of NACUSA Cascadia. A composer of chamber and symphonic music with published/recorded works and performances across the US and internationally, he is a speaker on interdisciplinary arts and oboe soloist specializing in contemporary music.

His composition honors include Winner of Robert Avalon International Competition for Composers – 2012 (2nd place), 2014 (3rd place). He was a finalist in the America Prize in

Composition Competition for (2012 Orchestra - Professional Division - All In A Moment's Time for Viola and Orchestra); 2013, 2014, 2015 Chamber Music - Professional Division -Expressions li for two Saxes, two Percussion, and Piano; Suspended for Bassoon and Strings, Random Blackouts I for Baritone and Piano (4 Hands)). He is the 2012 Bassoon Chamber Music Composition Competition winner (Suspended for Bassoon & Strings) and Winner of Con Vivo's Composers Competition (Native American Notes (Image Music VI) for String Quartet). He was named OMTA Composer of the Year 2012-13 and winner for 2015 of 10th NACUSA Texas Composition Competition for his Tip Top Tap Ballroom Bonanza version for Flute and Contrabass, His Honorable Mentions include the Flute New Music Consortium 2015 Composition Contest for his In Memoriam Sacajawea for Flute Quartet and from Cortona Prize 2016 for his From Argart for Soprano and Piano (2016). He was a Semi-Finalist in International Composition Competition "Maurice Ravel" Cat. B (2015), Cat. C (2016); Inquietude for Solo Flute selected for RMN Classical CD (London), (2016).

His recent commissions include the Delgani Quartet of Eugene, OR (From Songs Of The Fire Circles) and from Professor Paul Reilly, guitarist of Ball State University (Random Blackouts Iv for Tenor and Guitar).



SPOTLIGHT ON CHARLES ROLAND BERRY

ince 2010, Charles Roland Berry has worked as a film composer and arranger, his music included in *Spider-Man Home-coming, John Wick - Parabellum*, Mark Walhberg's *The Gambler* and *Infinite, Equalizer 2, Ted 2, Tammy, The Interview, Chappaquiddick, Kept Woman*, and *How To Train Your Dragon*, Luca and Back to the Outback. His music has also been used in TV shows: *Weeds, Lucifer, Sons of Anarchy, Lilyhammer*, and *Gotham*. Mr. Berry has lived in the Seattle area from 2000 to 2018, and has since moved to Sequim, WA.

Mr. Berry (born 1957 in Boston, MA) is an
American composer, all-Armenian on his mother's
side. He studied music history and music composition
at the University of California, Santa Barbara with Peter Racine Fricker.
Fricker taught him the intricate details of serialist music, and to discipline his musical imagination. He was not the best of students, due to his enthusiastic attitude and very short attention span. Later on, in 1982, he



met Paul Creston. in San Diego, CA, and studied composition with him for one year. For a time, he hosted a classical radio program on KBOO, community radio, in Portland, OR. He would host telephone interviews with famous composers. Some of these people included; Benjamin Lees, John Cage, George Crumb, George Rochberg, Ned Rorem, Karel Husa, and William Schuman. Berry edited the interviews to make them a half-hour in length, often adding excerpts of the particular composer's music. His correspondence with John Cage was published in New Directions in Music, 1988.

His recent work with the National Philharmonic Orchestra of Ukraine in Lviv resulted in a new recording of his Symphony no. 4. A video about

the collaboration was created and Berry said the following, "We had no idea this would be my last recording in Ukraine. Hopefully, when the troubles are over, I can return. This is a wonderful orchestra of the caliber of our major U.S. orchestras." You can view the full video here: https://youtu.be/IQ7CIIAeROU

Andrea Clearfield's Salon celebrated 36 years in September 2022! The Salon, a performance series modeled after 19th-century European salons, was founded in September 1986. From her website: "The Salon was conceived with the idea of continuing the Salon tradition with a contemporary spin – 10 ensembles X 10 minutes of classical, contemporary, jazz, world, electronic, chamber, opera, dance, multimedia and more – helping to build a vital and engaged community around the arts. The diverse programming has led to a cross-fertilization of the audience that continues to expand. In the thirty-five years since, more than 9000 performers and 19,000 audience

members have come through Andrea's living room and even more on the virtual stage since the pandemic. The Salon reflects the strong tradition of music in Philadelphia and beyond, builds and informs audiences, and fosters new art forms in an intimate and supportive atmosphere. It's been heralded as 'one of the best-known music salons in the country' with a 'deep bench of topflight musicians' and 'an underground sensation' (The Philadelphia Inquirer), and given the 'Best of Philly Award 2008' (Philadelphia Magazine).

The Salon has become a beloved Philadelphia cultural gathering. The online ZALON version was created in April, 2020 to continue the



REMEMBERING NED ROREM

We were saddened to hear of the passing of Composer Ned Rorem at age 99 on Friday, November 18th, 2022 at his home in Manhattan. He was a long-time Composers Bureau member and an SAI National Arts Associate. Rorem's career was a full and varied one, hinted at in this excerpt from his website's biography: "Words and music are inextricably linked for Ned Rorem. Time Magazine has called him 'the world's best composer of art songs,' yet his musical and literary ventures extend far beyond this specialized field. Rorem has composed three symphonies, four piano concertos and an array of other orchestral works, music for numerous combinations of

chamber forces, ten operas, choral works of every description, ballets and other music for the theater, and literally hundreds of songs and cycles. He is the author of sixteen books, including five volumes of diaries and collections of lectures and criticism."

Rorem studied at Northwestern University for two years, before receiving a scholarship to the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia. He studied composition under Bernard Wagenaar at Juilliard, earning both his BA and MA degrees. He then worked in New York as Virgil Thomson's copyist in return for \$20 a week and orchestration lessons. He studied on fellowship at the Berkshire Music Center in Tanglewood in the summers of 1946 and 1947; in 1948 his song *The Lordly Hudson* was voted the best



published song of that year by the Music Library Association. Known for his copious number of art songs, Rorem's catalog includes more than 500 of them, including his *Evidence of Things Not Seen*, an evening-length song cycle for four singers and piano. An avid writer, as well as composer, his most recent publication, *Facing the Night: A Diary (1999-2005)* and *Musical Writings*, chronicles Rorem's dark journey after the death of his 32 year companion, Jim Holmes.

Rorem was honored with numerous awards during his lifetime, including a Pulitzer Prize in 1976 for his suite *Air Music*. He received

a Fulbright Fellowship (1951), a Guggenheim Fellowship (1957), and an award from the National Institute of Arts and Letters (1968). The Atlanta Symphony recording of Rorem's *String Symphony, Sunday Morning*, and *Eagles* received a Grammy Award for Outstanding Orchestral Recording in 1989. He was a three-time winner of the ASCAP-Deems Taylor Award and was chosen as Composer of the Year by Musical America in 1988. From 2000 to 2003 he served as President of the American Academy of Arts and Letters. In 2003 he received ASCAP's Lifetime Achievement Award, and in January 2004 the French government named him Chevalier of the Order of Arts and Letters.



SPOTLIGHT ON MEIRA WARSHAUER

eira Warshauer's complete "Ocean Calling" trilogy for two pianos, which includes "Ocean Calling I: Waves and Currents," "Ocean Calling II: From the Depths," and "Ocean Calling III: The Giant Blue," was premiered by pianists Phillip Bush and Elizabeth Loparits as part of the University of South Carolina School of Music's acclaimed Southern Exposure New Music Series on 10/27/22. Recording sessions for Warshauer's "Ocean Calling" trilogy for two pianos were scheduled for December, 2022, with a planned release in spring 2023 under Parma's Navona label. Warshauer said of the pieces, "...my drive for composing 'Symphony Living Breathing Earth,' 'Ocean Calling, 'Ahavah (Love),' and other related

works, is that we can no longer take this living planet for granted...I hope the 'Ocean Calling' trilogy will help us to hear the cries from the sea that we are part of one interdependent whole."

From Warshauer's website: "Ocean Calling I: Waves and Currents revels in the joy of swimming at the seashore...Metric shifts, contrasting textures, and glissandi, both on keys and on strings inside the piano, help convey the swirling energy of waves, currents, wind, and spray. A metal chain rustles on vibrating strings to mimic the white noise of the



breakers, while attentive use of the damper pedal suggests liquid, underwater resonance, contrasted with bright, dry sounds above the surface...

...To evoke the incredibly varied and fantastical creatures of the sea, *Ocean Calling II: From the Depths*, uses one piano for 'inside the piano' techniques, including stopped notes, harmonic glissandi, plucking or strumming strings, and striking the strings with a glass. The other piano complements these colors with hints of fragility and lilting flow, contrasted with urgent dramatic movement and nostalgic reflections on what may be or already has been lost...

...In Ocean Calling III: The Giant Blue, I hope to convey the expanse of the sea, its

call and echo, ancient reverberations from the medium where life began. The title also refers to the Giant Blue Whale, believed to be earth's largest creature. Blue Whales are known to make two types of calls: the 'a' call, a regular pulsing, about 92 beat per minute; and the 'b' call, a low moan, dropping in frequency at the end. The music's pulsating chords with sustained bowed tones recall these whale sounds and their resonance through miles of ocean..."

A pre-concert talk will take place at 6:45 p.m. in the Koger Lobby.

Meira presented a program for the Afternoon Music Club of Columbia on 1/10/22 at a private residence in Columbia, S.C. The title of her program was "For the Love of Earth: Music of Meira Warshauer." She discussed and presented audio and video excerpts of several compositions inspired by her love for the Earth and her concern for its endangered condition. She also presented this program on 1/13/22 at First Presbyterian Church, Wilmington, NC and on 2/25/22 and at the University of South Carolina School of Music in Columbia, SC, as part of the University's Luise E. Peake Music and Culture Colloquium Series.

The Luise Peake Series also created a

podcast for their "Behind the Peake" series with Meira and marine scientist and artist Bonnie Monteleone (director of Plastic Ocean Project, Wilmington, NC). The podcast, titled "Art, Advocacy, Music, and Whale Songs: Meira Warshauer and Bonnie Monteleone," went live on 10/17/22. Meira's "Tekeeyah (a call)," her concerto for Shofar/Trombone and Orchestra was a finalist for the 2021 American Prize in Composition. The award was announced in May, 2022.

REMEMBERING ROBERT WYKES

recently learned of the June 29, 2021 passing of SAI Composers Bureau member Robert
Wykes in a letter from his wife, Rosalyn
Wykes, an SAI member initiated by Sigma
Delta in 1953. He was a prolific American composer of contemporary classical music, as well as a flautist. He studied music theory at the Eastman School of Music, earning his BM and MM degrees; he later studied composition at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, earning his DMA.

Wykes served in the US Army in the combat infantry in Europe during World War II and post-war in the 314th Armed Services

Band. He was a flutist in the Toledo Symphony Orchestra (1950-52), the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra (1963-67), and the Studio for New Music in St. Louis (1966-69). Professor Wykes taught composition and music theory at Bowling Green University (1950-52) and music theory at the University



of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (1953-55). He then taught composition at Washington University in St. Louis (1955-88), earning its Distinguished Faculty Award in 1976 and emeritus status in 1988.

His "Four Portraits" for flute quartet (2003) was recently featured on Washington University's April 2022 concert, titled "The Music Makers: 75 Years of Composition and Performance, with a tribute to Robert Wykes." Among his numerous works, he scored over twenty films, including "Monument to the Dream" (1967) about the building of St. Louis' Gateway Arch, "The Making of Liberty" (1986) about the building and renovation of

the Statue of Liberty, and the Academy Award-winning "Robert Kennedy Remembered" (1968), a documentary about the life and loss of Senator Kennedy. Learn more about Wykes' body of work at: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Robert_Wykes


