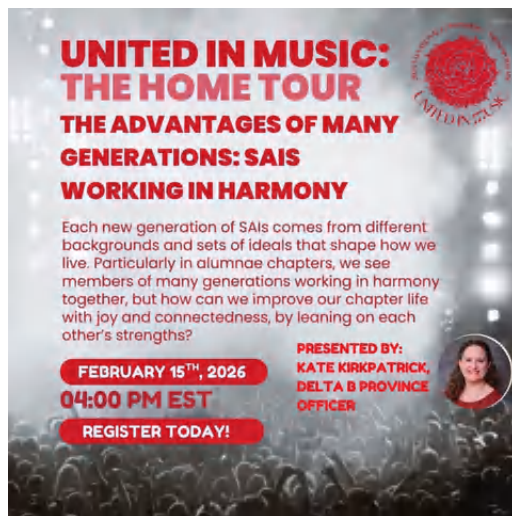

SAIs Working in Harmony: The Advantages of Many Generations

The best thing about alumnae chapter membership is getting to know members from many generations... and sometimes, this is also the hardest thing about alumnae chapters. Some of our chapters are fortunate enough to have members in their early 20s and also in their 90s; you may meet alumnae members, in the same chapter, from five generations. And that's the thing about generations, to quote the band Smash Mouth: "the years start coming, and they don't stop coming."

To illustrate the differences, here's a quick intro to each generation along with their typical preferred media.

- **Gen Z (1995-2009)** members live on their phones because it's always been that way; there's an app for everything and connectivity is vital.
- **Millennials (1980-1994)** grew up with cell phones, so texting and social media is very comfortable.
- **Gen X (1965-1979)** learned on Apple II computers and were early adopters of email.
- **Baby Boomers (1946-1964)** had party lines and telephones, and they often prefer a phone call or face-to-face meeting.
- **The Greatest Generation (1925-1945)** grew up during the Great Depression and World War II, and may not be as comfortable with technology, preferring face-to-face meetings and printed written communication.

With such a diverse mix of generations, chapters are constantly being asked to do something hard: reach and embrace every generation in the same chapter. How can our alumnae chapters provide SAI activities and communications that will resonate with members of all ages? Here

are seven tips to level up your chapter's offerings to attract more active membership:

Lean on the strengths of your generations.

Let's study the bright spots: your chapter will benefit when you identify and use generational strengths. For example, younger members may be more comfortable with technology and could help with new communication channels, while more experienced members may have more access to public meeting spaces or music libraries. Dedicate time to matching chapter volunteer positions to strengths and provide training to members who are willing to learn.

Expect more experienced members to stay involved longer.

The research doesn't lie. Some generations are larger than others, and all of us are living longer average lives. Consider:

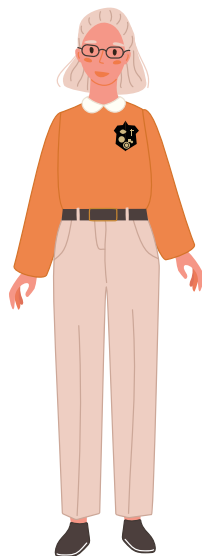
- According to the Pew Research Center, as of July 2019, Millennials have surpassed Baby Boomers as the nation's largest living adult generation.
- The U.S. centenarian population (age 100+) is projected to quadruple over the next 30 years (2024, Pew Research Center).
- Between 2015 and 2050, the proportion of the world's population over 60 years will nearly double from 12% to 22% (2025, World Health Organization).
- The U.S. Census projections from the 2023 National Population Project show a leveling out of the U.S. population, with a 0.0% increase in 2080 and annual decreases afterwards.

Based on these statistics, we can expect current alumnae of all ages to



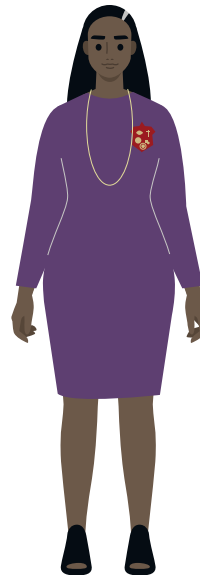

remain involved in SAI for many years. We can also anticipate continued population growth until 2080, after which it is expected to level off and then decline.

Promote your chapter's good work to inactive members, even if you don't feel like it's making a difference.

Staying in regular communication with inactive members, and recruiting prospective Patronesses, is key to growing SAI's membership. Just remember, everyone is getting spammed with content 24/7—so if you don't stay in touch, you're invisible and easier to forget. Make them feel welcome any time, and when they're ready, they'll know who to contact.

Know when to keep an activity and when to make updates.

In their book *The Power of Moments: Why Certain Experiences Have Extraordinary Impact* (2017), Chip and Dan Heath theorize that you remember moments, not every single minute of your life. The same can be said of your SAI experience, looking back: you likely remember the special moments. So, make more special moments!

When planning your annual schedule, it may be time to make significant changes to see a payoff from new members. Don't be afraid to change up your activities, offering a diverse list of events that will appeal to members of different age groups. For example, you may want to have a family-friendly event one month to entice younger members with children; the next could be a high tea; then try a craft night. Whatever you choose, remember to find your voice, promote what your chapter stands for, and stay true to it. Inactive SAI members loved us once, and they can do it again.

Pay attention to your data.

Survey your current activities and gather the facts to decide where to spend your valuable time and which areas may be draining your energy. Data can be found everywhere, such as:

- What kinds of events and meetings get the most participation? Do you know why? How can you plan more events like these?
- Survey your inactive members. Ask them what keeps them from joining your chapter. Is there anything that would bring them back to you?
- Speaking of communications: What data do you have access to? For example, are your emails being opened? What type of social posts get the most engagement? What would you need to do to grow your audience?

Avoid burnout.

SAI membership is for a lifetime, but life has a way of changing quickly. As a leader in your alumnae chapter, be aware of the emotional, physical and logistical demands that your members are facing. Sharing the work is key to keeping members involved and will help to avoid feelings of burnout.

Start observing Gen Alpha now.

Our youngest collegiate members, Gen Alpha (born 2010-2024), will be joining our alumnae chapters in just a few years. Already, Gen Alpha has been recognized for their love of slang and low tolerance for anything inauthentic. These students are hearing mixed messages about the importance of higher education, and your chapter may have to find new ways to relate.

Your chapter can't do everything all at once, and this is a marathon, not a sprint. By understanding generational differences and making the case for a variety of activities, both small and large chapters can make a big impact.

Workshop Recap

Communication Matters: Strategies for Impactful Interactions

Effective communication is a cornerstone of successful leadership, collaboration, and chapter operations. During the 51st National Convention, members gathered for the interactive workshop Communication Matters: Strategies for Impactful Interactions, presented by now NVP Fraternity Development Michelle Werner and Chi A Province Officer Kristi Pizzini.

The session explored the benefits and limitations of various communication formats—including face-to-face, email, phone, texting, and social media—and offered insights into when and how to use each method most effectively. Attendees shared real-life examples and reflected on how communication styles can differ between collegiate and alumnae members, sparking a rich and engaging dialogue.

The workshop continued with scenario-based discussions, allowing participants to evaluate who to contact in different situations and what communication method would be most appropriate based on urgency, tone, and clarity.

To wrap up the session, we offered a refresher on SAI communication best practices, including etiquette tips, the “Golden CC” rule, and a quick SAI Communication 101 guide to ensure members are fostering respectful, clear, and constructive exchanges. Through hands-on activities and peer insights, attendees walked away with strategies to build stronger connections, enhance teamwork, and promote a more positive, productive communication culture within our sisterhood.

KEY POINTS:

- All vendors and products using SAI's name, nickname, Greek letters, or symbols must be licensed through National Headquarters.
- Only approved vendors may produce goods or materials with our trademarks.
- Members cannot use SAI trademarks for commercial purposes without prior approval.

Theta Lambda
Furman University, Greenville, NC

It was a crisp Saturday afternoon in late October, perfect for celebrating homecoming festivities. Furman University had just finished their first half against Mercer University, and halftime meant the winners of Furman's annual week-long Homecoming competition would be announced. Every student could feel the anticipation for these twenty minutes. This included the members of Sigma Alpha Iota's Theta Lambda chapter, who stood spread between the field and stands of Paladin Stadium with their breaths held, eyes closed, and hands clasped together. As representatives from the Homecoming competitors took the field, they stared longingly at the monumental trophy held by the president of Furman's Student Alumni Council (SAC), wondering if it was their turn to take home the gold.

This trophy has winners engraved on it starting in the mid-1990s, long after Furman began celebrating Homecoming in 1919, but not long before the Theta Lambda chapter was chartered in 1997. In the chapter's almost thirty-year history, its name has never been on the trophy. Each year two or three fraternities, sororities, or other student organizations that have been paired together by SAC and the Student Government Association participate. The trophy is presented to the overall winner of Furman's Homecoming competition. The competition consists of four events during the week leading up to the football game: Banner Painting, Chalking, Horseplay, and Pumping. In addition, competitors earn spirit points for the percentage of member attendance at each event. Homecoming itself and the competition also have an overarching theme, with each group of organizations receiving a subcategory of this theme to base their participation in events around. For 2025, Furman rolled out the purple carpet for a movie-themed Homecoming. Theta Lambda was paired with Phi Mu Alpha's Gamma Eta chapter, a men's music fraternity, with the subcategory of Mystery.

While it may have been more fitting for Theta Lambda and Gamma Eta to be given a subcategory like Music rather than Mystery, the ideas for a mystery movie-themed banner, chalk art, skit, and pumped float began stirring immediately. The plans began with late-night meetings in the Music Building Library by the two fraternities' Homecoming Committees, led by each organization's social chair and composed of four to five more willing members. Numerous sketches and rough drafts came from these meetings until the banner, chalk art, and float became intricate works of art placed on grids for easy execution, and the skit became a multiple-page script.

Homecoming week began on the Monday night before the Saturday game with Banner Painting. Theta Lambda and Gamma Eta recreated Detective Benoit Blanc's chair made of knives from the murder mystery *Knives Out* on their nine-foot-long piece of paper. Instead of Blanc or any of his suspects sitting in the chair with the text "Knives Out" above it, it was Furman's mascot Victor, a purple and silver knight-like figure, with the text "Knights Out."

Tuesday's activity, chalking, occurred at the Dining Hall. Each team receives a 5-foot-by-5-foot square to create a chalk art design on the concrete leading up to the building's entrance. Like their banner, Theta Lambda and Gamma Eta tied Furman's mascot to a mystery classic, this time Sherlock Holmes. They adorned Victor with a spyglass,

a tie, and a mustache.

The most unique Homecoming competition event is Horseplay. Teams are tasked with creating a seven-minute skit to be performed in front of all competing organizations and a live panel of judges, who also judge the other events. Theta Lambda and Gamma Eta had the audience and judges holding their stomachs over a reimagined version of the movie and board game Clue. The skit told a classic who-done-it tale about the Dining Hall's missing ice cream machine, with character names pulled from favorite Furman locations and people.

The Homecoming competition wrapped up with Pumping, the most daunting event. This year, teams had to build their own three-dimensional float that they covered in chicken wire and stuffed with tissue paper. These floats were put on display along the Furman Mall. For their final event, Theta Lambda and Gamma Eta recreated Scooby Doo's Mystery Machine. This Mystery Machine was fitted with a steering wheel, working headlights, the Sigma Alpha Iota and Phi Mu Alpha Greek letters, and even an interior filled with question marks and fairy lights that could be used for photo opportunities or to grab a Scooby Snack.

As members of Theta Lambda stood on the field in the culminating moment of the homecoming events, the air went silent in Paladin Stadium. It was time to announce the overall winner of the Homecoming competition, something Theta Lambda had never achieved. An occasional individual event was won, but never first place. In 2025, Theta Lambda had taken home best Spirit, Horseplay, and Pumping. However, with each event having different weights determining the overall winner, this did not guarantee the overall win. Members had waited all week for the news that their hard work, effort, and sisterhood were worth it. Suddenly, the silence was interrupted with joyous screams of the members of Theta Lambda as they heard their name called as the winner of Homecoming 2025.
