SAI Convention Workshop Recap: Applying for Chapter Outreach Grants

Many SAI chapters are unaware of the opportunity they have to apply for a Chapter Outreach Grant from Sigma Alpha Iota Philanthropies, Inc. At the Sigma Alpha Iota National Convention in Minneapolis, I, along with two of my committee members, presented a workshop about how far a chapter can go with the funding that we can help provide.

A chapter can apply for up to \$500 in funding for support of an outreach project in their local community. In the application, the chapter must provide information regarding where their matching funds will be coming from to meet the grant amount. An example: if a chapter wants to apply for \$250, they must also raise \$250 to help offset the project’s costs. Some fundraising ideas that chapters had included having a movie night on campus, where they show a movie but only charge for concessions such as popcorn and snacks. Other ideas were to hold a silent auction or collect member donations. The amount of chapter income (fundraised + grant) must match the amount of the project’s expenses for the grant to be awarded.

Another area that we discussed was the benefit that we have seen happen by connecting collegiate and alumnae chapters. I shared that the Tampa Bay Alumnae Chapter applied for a grant for a joint outreach project they hold with Delta Chi Chapter every year. Their outreach project helps supply local schools with much needed equipment or music for their classrooms. Some workshop attendees liked knowing that chapters can work together on an outreach project for their local community. At the end of the session, there was time for a breakout session and members talked to each other about possible outreach project ideas, such as: bringing in guest speakers for workshops/clinics at colleges; supporting a free concert for the community; having a fundraising concert that also supports the church or venue where an alumnae chapter would have their monthly meetings.

Once the project has been completed, a report must be submitted to the grant director with detailed information on the outcome of the project. Many of these follow-up reports have been included in the fall issue of Pan Pipes or in Tempo! This is done to share project ideas with other chapters that encourage raising awareness about Sigma Alpha Iota and what our organization is about.
