## *Social Media Performance*

**Facebook:** Experienced significant growth, with views up 253% (94,561), interactions up 350% (3,305), and 46 new followers.

**Instagram:** Achieved 76.8K views (up 191.5%), 3.4K interactions (up 135.1%), and 13.4K reach (up 55.3%).

## **2025-26 Community Arts Grant for 501c3 Organizations Grantees**

SAI Philanthropies, Inc. is pleased to announce the grant recipients for the inaugural year of the Community Arts Grant for 501c3 Organizations program. From a pool of 25 applicants, we awarded grants to seven organizations to support a wide variety of programs. Grantees included: Andromeda Electric Orchestra (North Hills, CA), Thursday Musical (St. Paul, MN), North Atlanta Voices, Inc. (Atlanta, GA), Salon (Philadelphia, PA), Waterloo Wind Band (Austin, TX), Beaver City Symphonic Wind Band (Beaver, PA), and the South Indiana Wind Ensemble (Bloomington, IN).

The modest grants (all were less than \$5,000 each) will support a variety of projects including commissioning a new composition for wind band, producing a 40th Anniversary documentary film, launching two new youth music competitions, music and voice lessons for volunteer choir members, purchasing digital music library software, concert season production expenses, and expanding a senior day care recital series.

In the coming months, information on each grantee and their project will be posted on Sigma Alpha Iota social media. Congratulations to all our 2025-26 grantees.

## **Tuning Out the Doubt: Overcoming Imposter Syndrome**

Musicians spend years preparing for performances, auditions, and leadership opportunities, but even the most accomplished performers can struggle with self doubt. During Tuning Out the Doubt: Overcoming Imposter Syndrome, we explored how imposter syndrome often shows up in the performing arts through comparison, perfectionism, fear of making mistakes, and the feeling that we have to prove we belong.

Throughout the session, participants reflected on their own experiences and discussed practical ways to quiet the inner critic, trust their preparation, and approach performances with greater confidence. We talked about the importance of giving ourselves the same grace we so freely give others and recognizing that growth as a performer comes from embracing challenges, not avoiding them.

Whether you are a student, educator, performer, or arts leader, this webinar offers practical strategies to help you move beyond self doubt and perform with authenticity. Confidence does not come from being perfect. It comes from believing in your preparation, embracing your unique artistry, and continuing to share your gifts even when doubt tries to take center stage. You can watch the webinar replay here:
